#### STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

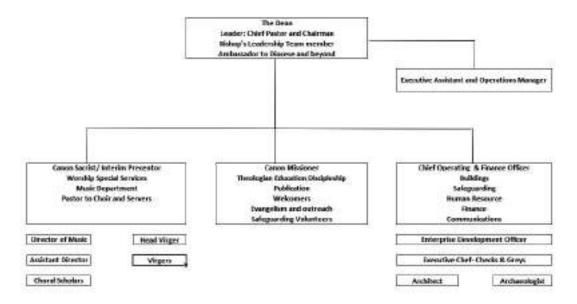
#### **Governing Statute**

The Cathedral is the Seat of the Bishop, supporting him in his mission and ministry in the Diocese and beyond, and offering welcome and hospitality at diocesan services and other events to all the parishes of the Diocese.

### The Chapter

The management of the Cathedral is executed by the Cathedral Chapter. The Chapter is responsible for the oversight and administration of Cathedral affairs, specifically the ordering of worship and the promotion of the Cathedral's mission; the management, repair and maintenance of its properties; the preparation of an annual budget, an annual report and audited accounts; keeping under review the Constitution and Statutes of the Cathedral; and keeping the Cathedral Council informed of planned developments. The Bishop as Visitor is kept informed of developments by the Chapter.

- The improvement or development of property belonging to the Cathedral, except that endowment funds may not be used to improve or develop the Cathedral itself and its ancillary buildings.

#### **OUR VISION**

During 2019 we launched our Cathedral Strategic Plan, celebrating almost 1500 years of Christian worship on this site. It is a story of faith lived out in the lives of Lancashire people who have chosen to put Jesus at the heart of their community.

Our purpose is clear: in telling the story of Jesus Christ, we seek to help people encounter God through worship and service to the community.

Our key areas of focus reflect our commitment to the Diocesan 2026 Vision of making disciples, being witnesses and growing leaders.

We continue to work at both being a healthy congregation and at being a resource for other churches.

The work with children and young people remains a high priority within the Cathedral's mission through its choirs; the music outreach programme; curriculum-related school visits; a growing Sunday School and preparation for Confirmation and Holy Communion. We continue to see growth in the number of school visits to the Cathedral and a closer working relationship with the Diocesan Board of Education.

#### **ACTIVITIES, ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE**

The year proved to be one of change and transition for the Cathedral, with welcome shoots of growth and fresh development for the future. We deeply thank the Dean for his strength of purpose in leading the Cathedral through challenging times and were glad he was able to take an extended period of absence in the summer.

#### **WORSHIP AND SERVICE**

We joined in the national celebration of the Platinum Jubilee of H.M. Queen Elizabeth II with a service of thanksgiving on 29 May, including a march past and an address by Bishop Julian Henderson on the significance of the National Anthem. On 18 September we returned to offer up our thanks once again, but this time for the completion of Her Majesty's life of service up to the time of her death on 8 September, with Bishop Philip North vividly recounting her lifelong dedication to the nation.

These were just two of the special services during the year. We began with the Accession Day Choral Evensong on 6 February and continued with the visit of Archbishop Stephen Cottrell on 29 May, a 40 Year Celebration of Ministry for Revd. Canon Gary O'Neill on 10 July with an address by Archbishop John Sentamu, and the final service for our own Bishop Julian Henderson on 16 July.

The year was rounded off with two BBC 1 nationally televised services, first for Christmas Eve with a traditional Eucharist and again on Christmas Day, using more contemporary setting. Large numbers of congratulatory messages were received from across the world to the choir, and the creativity and energy that the two services generated will continue into the future.

These occasions marked an unusually exciting and developmental year in the life of the Music Department under the directorship of Mr. John Robinson. Organ Scholar Miss Samantha Poh left to become Assistant Organist at Christ Church Cathedral New Zealand and the new position of Organist in Residence was launched in September 2022. Thus, Mr. John Hosking is responsible not just for organ playing but for building the profile of the organ, through concerts, recordings, streaming and other initiatives. The Chapter supported Mr. Robinson's proposal that, following steps in that direction taken during the year, the boy and girl choristers should be mixed from the beginning of 2023.

The junior choral scholar scheme was successfully launched in September, with four ex-choristers as the first recipients. They bring a fresh and youthful sound to the Cathedral Choir and the Youth Choir, with the latter not only singing at the Sunday 9.00 a.m. service under the direction of Ms. Helen Davies, but also acting as ambassadors for the Cathedral in the Diocese. St Paul's Voices, the voluntary choir, has been taken under Mr. Hosking's wing, with the Director of Music as accompanist.

The launch of the Lantern Music Trust took place at the Christmas Spectacular, with Dr John Bertalot as Honorary President. This was the first step towards an organisation designed to endow the complete costs of music at the Cathedral, paving the way for future generations to become part of Blackburn's rightly renowned musical reputation.

The Cathedral organ is reported to be in serviceable shape, although both short- and medium-term maintenance work has been identified in order to uphold its standards. The Cathedral has moved its care back to its original builders, J.W. Walker, who bring a high level of expertise to a complicated and unusual instrument. The initiative to record the organ for Hauptwerk, thus making the digital files of every note available for downloading, has resulted in significant international interest in the instrument.

An important innovation, with Bishop Philip as sponsor and supported by £1.4 million of National Church funding, has been provided for the launch of Choir Church, a national project which has now been adopted here in Lancashire. Church-planting has been taking place in Church of England primary schools across the Diocese, using the power of fine music in liturgy, and with Dr Rebekah Okpoti warmly welcomed as Choir Church Coordinator.

Other special occasions included the day-long Festival of Faith in Daily Life on 19 March with a keynote speech by Lord Alton, the launch of the Queen's Jubilee Tapestries by the Lord Lieutenant and his deputies on 1 June, and the concert spectacular on 10 December to launch the Lantern Music Trust.

The ringers have enjoyed a full year. The 70th anniversary of Queen Elizabeth's accession in February, the thanksgiving service for her Platinum Jubilee in May, the celebration of her life on 9 September and her funeral on 19 September were all marked with special peals, as was the proclamation of the accession of King Charles III on 11 September. Bishop Julian's farewell service on 16 July was celebrated with a quarter peal on the back eight bells, and bells were rung for three weddings during the year. While there were problems with attendance at Sunday services and Thursday practices, all of the learners remained with the tower, and ringers from Oswaldtwistle and St Silas also helped out on a reciprocal basis.

#### **GOVERNANCE AND FINANCE**

The Chapter met on ten occasions, with input by the Finance Committee and the Safeguarding Management Group, and with Ms. Carol Fletcher of the Church Commissioners in attendance on most occasions.

A settlement agreement with the Revd. Andrew Hindley was concluded by deed on 28 February and an agreed statement read out by the Dean to the congregation on 10 April. The Bishop of Blackburn commissioned a lesson to be learned review, and interviews were conducted with key people over the summer. The findings from the review are still awaited.

Mr. Stuart Jones resigned his position as Chapter Clerk and was replaced by Mr. Colin Jones.

Mr. Jones left his post as Chief Finance and Operational Officer in December.

The Revd. Canon Andrew Sage retired from his post at St Stephen's in Blackpool to a residential post on the other side of the Pennines, and hence left the College of Canons and the Chapter. His expertise, particularly on Diocesan housing, will be much missed. Bishop Philip North also left the Chapter on 31 August, and subsequently became the Acting Diocesan Bishop. A Chapter dinner was held for them both, at which grateful thanks for their wisdom and much-valued contributions were offered. Thanks were also expressed to the Revd. Canon Andrew Horsfall for his service as a residentiary canon. The College of Canons vacancy on the Chapter has been filled by Canon David Gascoigne.

The Revd. Canon Dr Rowena Pailing resigned from her post as Canon Missioner in September in order to take up a senior position with a national charity and was warmly thanked for her important contributions to the missional development of the Cathedral and to its safeguarding. The Revd. James Lawrence, who continues his doctoral study with the University of Oxford and following a residency in New York, succeeded to the post of Canon Missioner and his installation took place on 11 December.

The Cathedrals Measure 2021 was the subject of an informal away day in July. The Dean and some members of the Chapter also attended the Cathedrals Strategic Leadership Event in Manchester at the beginning of November, in preparation for the Cathedral to begin its work on its transition to the new measure in line with the agreed timetable.

Mr. James Sanderson resigned his post as Cathedral Architect in September after more than twenty years in post, a period dominated by the development and completion of Clergy Court. Ms. Louise Priestman was appointed and gave a presentation to the Chapter on her initial perceptions of the Cathedral's fabric and setting. While the Cathedral is fortunate to be in good condition overall, the Chapter agreed that a quinquennial review should be commissioned a year early to assess needs and opportunities for the institution's estate.

The Chapter continued its watchful scrutiny of the Cathedral's financial position throughout the year. The successful tenancy of the Crypt by the NHS vaccination service came to an end in September. concluding with a planned programme to reinstate the area the staff had occupied. A scheme to lease out Church House was being actively negotiated during the year, but without a final outcome.

Much effort went into the Cathedral restaurant, Checks and Greys, to make it commercially viable and build up its business in the face of challenging economic times. The Chapter was greatly encouraged by the energetic approach of Ms. Sian Goggins, appointed as Enterprise Development Officer in September. She at once carried out a wholesale review of the business, including menu revision, staffing, and advertising. Additional event income was explored and revised financial targets, agreed with the Chapter, were exceeded. A large number of Christmas lunches took place and a Christmas market in the Crypt on 3 December was a welcome innovation.

The Cathedral Safeguarding Management Group continued to meet regularly. Its structure and role were reconsidered early in the year, resulting in continuation of its hybrid nature as both strategic and operational. The group agreed to align its terms of reference more closely with the Diocesan Safeguarding Advisory Panel and to recruit an independent chair, to which Ms. Carolyn Johnson was warmly welcomed in December. The group received and incorporated updates from the National Safeguarding Team and worked closely with the Diocese, including on the adoption of the survivor care strategy and a potential service level agreement between Cathedral and Diocese. The Cathedral is also part of the IICSA pilot, with access to new policy developments as they arise. An important change is a shift away from having due regard to safeguarding measures endorsed by the House of Bishops and towards a Safeguarding Code of Practice.

The Chapter is deeply grateful to the many people who contribute so fully and generously to the Cathedral's life and mission, and on whom the institution is able to rely for their unfailing devotion and support.

#### FINANCIAL REVIEW

The results for the year are shown in the Consolidated Statement of Financial Activities. During the year there were net unrestricted incoming resources of £4,365 (2021: £19,028). The total unrestricted funds were £961,740 (2021: £917,693).

The restricted funds showed net outgoing resources of £72,928 (2021: £32,179) with income largely consisting of grants from the Church Commissioners. With investment gains and transfers between funds total restricted funds were £318,555 (2021: £477,030).

Endowment funds show net incoming resources of £Nil (2021: £Nil) as no further income was received in relation to Cathedral Court. At 31 December 2022, endowment funds totalled £2,167,907 (2021: £2,182,145).

Losses recognised on the revaluation of investments across all funds amounted to £60,103 (2021: Gain £64,205).

The net cash inflow from operating activities was £147,212 (2021: outflow £17,395). Cash reserves at the year-end were £354,749 (2021: £174,810). The Cathedral had net liabilities of £76,912 (2021: £30,686) because of amounts earmarked for the settlement of the final balance that is owed to the main contractor for Cathedral Court. Plans are under way to improve the cash flow position of the Cathedral as part of the continuing financial improvement process.

### **Going Concern**

The Church Commissioners paid all 2022 grants in full in April 2022, with payment of the 2023 full year grant being made in January 2023.

In consideration of all of the above, Chapter do not consider there to be a material uncertainty relating to going concern in particular due to having general funds of £732,581 (2021: £688,534), including investments of £204,702 (2021: £228,249) in the general fund that can be drawn down if required, to support operations.

#### **Reserves Policy**

Determining the level of free reserves and designated reserves the Cathedral needs to hold is an important part of Chapter's financial management and forward financial planning. Reserves levels that are too high may tie up money unnecessarily and limit the amount spent on charitable activities, reducing the potential benefit the Cathedral can provide. Reserve levels that are too low not only could impact the Cathedral's long-term solvency, but also the Cathedral could face difficulty in meeting its day-to-day expenditure commitments. Chapter's aim is to build all its funds, including its reserves held in unrestricted funds, to levels sufficient to address the Cathedral's long-term sustainability and perpetual need to maintain and preserve the Cathedral's heritage and fabric.

This aim is set in the context of the Cathedral's stated vision and priorities. This means establishing sufficient funds to develop and grow the Cathedral of the future, alongside retaining sufficient readily accessible reserves to meet the financial liabilities inherent in running and maintaining an historic Cathedral, as well as other Cathedral properties. The Cathedral's reserves not only need to cover short-term financial volatility and ongoing financial liabilities, but also act as a funding source for specific projects or development activity that is considered likely to generate long-term strategic and financial benefit.

The nature of the Cathedral's long-term financial commitments and its related income profile means it invests part of both its unrestricted and restricted funds to generate a financial return, in essence holding income as quasi-capital. Chapter is confident this is in the Cathedral's best interests.

Chapter have considered an appropriate level of unrestricted reserves in the short term as at 31 December 2022 to be at least £450,000. This is based on an estimate of ongoing unrestricted expenditure for a minimum one-year period. The current value of the unrestricted general funds as at 31 December 2022 is £732,581 with an additional £229,159 in designated funds relating to the Cathedral and Cathedral Court fixtures and fittings.

#### **Investment Policy**

During 2019, Chapter transferred investment funds from St James' Place to CCLA. Chapter's policy is to hold these funds to generate income and long-term capital growth.

Any investment funds held by Chapter that may be required in the foreseeable future are held in UK Bank Deposit funds with immediate access to the capital.

#### Forecast of cost of maintaining and conserving the Cathedral and its Precincts

A quinquennial survey was undertaken during 2019 by Mr. James Sanderson, the Cathedral Architect, and a report presented to Chapter. What is clear from the report is that the general fabric of the Cathedral building is in a good state of repair. As part of the report a priority rating has been given for each action identified and we are pleased that there are no category 'A' actions required. There are seven category 'B' actions required but nothing of significance. Chapter will endeavor to work through identified actions during the next five years.

#### **Public Benefit**

The Chapter confirms that they have complied with the duty in section 17 of the Charities Act 2011 to have due regard to public benefit guidance and have referred to the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing aims and objectives and in planning future activities.

#### PLANS FOR FUTURE PERIODS

Within the next twelve months, the Chapter plans are as follows:

- To set in place a delivery structure for the Strategic Plan 2019-2024
- To agree an amended financial recovery plan and set in place a strategy for delivery
- To work closely with Blackburn Cathedral Trust to develop income streams to enable us to
  maintain and expand our highly successful community programmes including the music
  outreach programme and community cohesion work. We will continue to deliver a first-class
  music offering which includes concerts, events, excellent musical education for both the
  children and young people in our choirs and our choral and organ scholars
- To develop new areas of income through Blackburn Cathedral Enterprises Ltd
- To continue to review options for the future use of Church House and Crypt development.

# Report of the Fabric Advisory Committee

The Committee met four times during 2022, a difficult year in terms of personnel with the unexpected departure of the Cathedral's Architect, James Sanderson, which took effect as from August.

It has been a privilege to work with James throughout the last 20 years – his lasting achievement, of course, is the delivery of Clergy Court but it's also right to reaffirm that during his term of appointment much grant funded restoration work has also been completed on the older Cathedral fabric which is in fine condition generally.

In September, we welcomed the newly appointed Cathedral Architect, Louise Priestman, a respected Heritage/Conservation Architect with other Cathedral/Ecclesiastical appointments as a member of the practice of Shaw & Jagger.

It was gratifying to record how many architects applied for the position at Blackburn.

Also, during 2022, two longstanding and valued members of FAC retired, Mike Millward and Revd. Peter Cavanagh. I'd like to place on record my personal thanks for their help and support over many years.

We welcome a range of new committee members – Emma Birkett with valuable experience in regeneration projects, Chris O'Flaherty from Central Lancashire University with specialism in building conservation and adaptation, Ivan Wilson, a local Architect and respected Conservation Design Consultant and Kate Shuttleworth, an experienced Conservation Building Cost Consultant.

In terms of the Cathedral fabric, slow but steady progress is being made on the rectification of defects throughout Clergy Court with the expectation that external render repairs will be completed during hopefully drier/milder weather in early to mid-2023.

The committee has also been consulted on a number of localised issues which are being investigated further including concerns over the electrical lighting circuits, the stability of pinnacles on the Corona and damp penetration in the vicinity of the Columbarium.

Sadly, the income stream from the National Health Service has finished, following the relocation of the Vaccination centre from the Crypt. However, the remedial works in the Crypt have left it in a much better state of presentation. A number of detailed proposals for its use are likely to come forward over the next year or so, and the use of the space in the Crypt can be adjusted to address urgent safeguarding issues for young choristers.

After a period of bedding in the new Choir arrangements appear to be generally acceptable and an improvement and the success in attracting the BBC for a number of services over the Festive period in late 2022 has firmly put Blackburn Cathedral on the map – live streaming will continue to be a feature and will require further enhancement in terms of camera positions, wiring and lighting.

### Notes to the Accounts

#### 1. Accounting policies

#### 1.1. Basis of preparation of financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102). The Cathedral and its subsidiaries are a public benefit group for the purposes of FRS 102 and therefore the Cathedral also prepared its financial statements in accordance with the Accounting and Reporting by English Anglican Cathedrals as specified by the Church Commissioners in preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102).

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention as modified to include the revaluation of property and investments. The consolidated financial statements incorporate all assets and liabilities and income and expenditure of Blackburn Cathedral Developments, as per that company's unaudited financial statements.

The consolidated financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis.

The Chapter do not consider there to be a material uncertainty relating to going concern in particular due to having general funds of £732,581 (2021: £688,534), including investments of £204,702 (2021: £228,249) in the general fund that can be drawn down if required, to support operations.

#### 1.2. Funds

Funds are split between endowment, restricted and unrestricted funds. Movements on these funds are summarized in Notes 19, 20 and 21.

Endowment funds are those where there is no power to convert the capital to income.

Restricted funds are funds subject to specific conditions imposed by the donor or by specific terms of a trust deed or other legal measure.

#### 1.3 Property and investments

Investment property and Investments are included in the financial statements at market value. Realised and unrealised gains and losses are reported in the Consolidated Statement of Financial Activities.

#### 1.4 Non-Investment property and Equipment and plant

Property for Cathedral use is included at latest valuation and, after considering the residual value, is depreciated at 2% straight line over its expected useful life. The Cathedral Court is not depreciated as the residual value in 50 years is expected to be at least that of its current market value as the Chapter will be running a strict capital maintenance programme on the property.

Property in the course of construction was included at cost and no depreciation has been charged. The cost has been transferred to the appropriate asset categories upon the completion of the project.

Equipment and plant are included at cost and are depreciated at 10% or 20% straight line over their expected useful lives. The Chapter has adopted a capitalisation limit of £1,000 per separately identifiable asset.

#### 1.5 Stock

Stocks are valued at the lower of cost and net realizable value, after making due allowance for slow moving items.

#### 1.6 Incoming resources

Donations, legacies, and grants are included in the financial statements on a receivable basis when there is entitlement to the funds, the receipt is probable, and the amount can be measured reliably. A debtor is included for Gift Aid reclaimable

#### 1.7 Grants receivable

Grants receivable which are subject to conditions or restrictions are credited to the restricted fund in the Consolidated Statement of Financial Activities, depending on the category of expenditure incurred to which they relate as soon as they are received or become receivable. The related expenditure incurred is charged to the restricted fund in the Consolidated Statement of Financial Activities as appropriate.

If a grant has been received or is receivable and either the related expenditure has not been incurred or the conditions of the grant have not been satisfied, then the grant is carried forward in restricted funds in the balance sheet. If expenditure has been incurred prior to the receipt of the related grant, but with other conditions satisfied, then the grant receivable is credited to the Consolidated Statement of Financial Activities and carried forward as a debtor in the balance sheet.

#### 1.8 Costs of raising funds

Costs of raising funds comprises costs of attracting voluntary income and costs of trading for fundraising purposes.

#### 1.9 Expenditure on mission

Expenditure on mission comprise costs of the Cathedral's ministry, upkeep of the Cathedral fabric and precincts, education and outreach, and community, parish, and congregation costs.

#### 1.10. Support costs

Support costs are allocated to expense categories on the basis of the direct costs incurred in that expense category.

#### 1.11. Repairs

Repairs, restoration, and maintenance are written off as incurred within Cathedral and precincts upkeep.

#### 1.12. Pensions

The Chapter contributes to a pension scheme for the clergy staff administered by the Church of England Pension Scheme. This scheme operates as an occupational pension scheme and contributions, at a rate determined having regard to actuarial advice, are paid into a separate fund in the trusteeship of the Church of England Pensions Board. Benefits arising from pensionable service are provided from that fund. The contributions to the fund by the Cathedral are charged to the Consolidated Statement of Financial Activities as incurred, as the scheme is a multi-employer scheme, and it is not possible to identify the assets and liabilities relating to the Cathedral. These contributions are funded by a grant from The Church of England Church Commissioners.

The Chapter also contributes to personal pension schemes for selected employees, these costs are charged to the Consolidated Statement of Financial Activities as incurred.

From 1 January 2016 Chapter operated an auto-enrolment pension scheme, in addition to those previously mentioned, for all eligible employees. The costs of this scheme are charged to the Consolidated Statement of Financial Activities as incurred.

#### 1.13. Third party and non-cash receipts and payments

Where amounts are payable on behalf of the Cathedral by third parties, for example, the Church Commissioners, these are disclosed under both income and expenditure in the Consolidated Statement of Financial Activities

#### 1.14. Taxation

The Cathedral Chapter is a statutory exempt charity under the Charities Act 2011 and, as such, is entitled to claim exemption from the charge to tax on income and capital gains as stated in section 258 TCGA 1992. Accordingly, with the exception of Value Added Tax and Employer's National Insurance, no liability to taxation arises.

Income is shown net of value added tax. Input value added tax is reclaimable on a percentage basis subject to partial exemption rules. All irrecoverable value added tax is included under the appropriate classification of expenditure, irrecoverable VAT on fixed asset purchases is capitalised within the cost of the asset.

#### 1.15. Donated assets and services

As stated in the Annual Report, the Cathedral very much appreciates the donation of time and services by Friends and other volunteers. It has not proved possible, however, to provide a monetary valuation on these services to incorporate the same into these accounts.

#### 1.16. Heritage Assets

The Cathedral holds a number of heritage assets with historic and artistic value. The nature and scale of the collection and inventory belonging to the Chapter of Blackburn include:

- The Medieval Pax
- Blackburn Cathedral Archives
- Blackburn Cathedral wall monuments
- Blackburn Cathedral 20th Century Art works
- Mark Jalland's 'The Healing of the Nations'
- The Whalley Seals and Misericords
- Other artefacts, including the Saxon Hammer and ancient manuscripts

The Cathedral's policy for the acquisition, preservation, management, and disposal of heritage assets is described in Section 24(1) of the Care of Cathedrals Measure 2011.

Note 12 of these financial statements gives further details regarding the age and history of the Cathedral, together with the insured value of the Cathedral buildings and its content.

The Cathedral inventory comprises of purchased and donated items over several centuries and these are retained by the Cathedral for religious, architectural, archaeological, artistic, and historic interest.

Valuation of the Cathedral Inventory is not deemed necessary for the day-to-day operation of the Cathedral. The quantity of items and the diverse nature of the collection would make valuation prohibitively expensive compared with the additional benefits derived by the Cathedral and users of the financial statements. As a result, no value is reported for these assets in the Balance Sheet.

Expenditure which is required to preserve or prevent further deterioration of individual items, is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities when it is incurred.

#### 22. Pension schemes

The Chapter also contributes to defined contribution stakeholder pension schemes for selected employees in addition to those disclosed in Note 8. The contributions for the year totaled £8,489 (2021: £5,285) and there were no contributions outstanding at the year end.

#### 23. Related entities

Blackburn Cathedral Developments, a company limited by guarantee, is controlled by the Chapter. The results and balance sheet of the company are consolidated in these accounts. The company made a deficit of £20,540 (2021: £102,903) during the year, and had net assets of £176,558 (2021: £197,097) at 31 December 2022. The accounts of the company include income from the Cathedral of £2,000 (2021: £20,904). Included within creditors on the Chapter's own balance sheet is £263,948(2021: £308,160) owed to Blackburn Cathedral Developments. Blackburn Cathedral Developments made purchases of £nil (2021: £6,000) from a company connected to a member of the Cathedral Chapter.

Blackburn Cathedral Enterprises Limited is a company limited by shares and is controlled by the Chapter. The results and balance sheet of the company are consolidated in these accounts. The company made a deficit of £21,904 (2021: surplus of £5,497) during the year, and had net liabilities of £58,397 (2021: £37,303) at 31 December 2022. The accounts of the company include income from the Cathedral of £163,847 (2021: £7,012). Included within debtors on the Chapter's own balance sheet is £59,750 (2021: £51,165) owed from Blackburn Cathedral Enterprises Limited.

The Chapter also paid £2,525 to a company connected to a member of the Cathedral Chapter for accountancy services.

The Friends of Blackburn Cathedral and Blackburn Cathedral Trust operate independently of the Chapter but are wholly for the benefit of the Cathedral. Income receivable from these entities in the financial statements.
