## STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

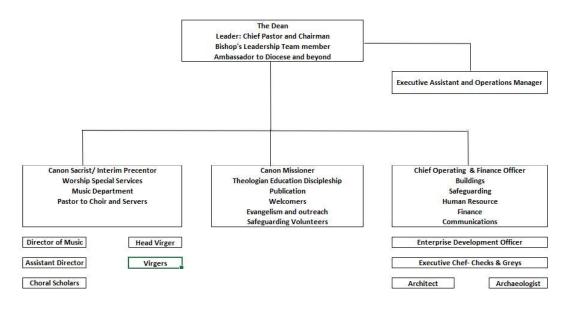
### **Governing Statute**

The Constitution and Statutes of the Cathedral Church of St Mary the Virgin, Blackburn, which came into effect on 20 May 2018.

### The Cathedral's Role within the Diocese

The Cathedral is the Seat of the Bishop, supporting him in his mission and ministry in the Diocese and beyond, and offering welcome and hospitality at diocesan services and other events to all the parishes of the Diocese.

### The Cathedral's Organisational Structure



#### The Chapter

The management of the Cathedral is executed by the Cathedral Chapter. The Chapter is responsible for the oversight and administration of Cathedral affairs, specifically the ordering of worship and the promotion of the Cathedral's mission; the management, repair, and maintenance of its properties; the preparation of an annual budget, an annual report, and audited accounts; keeping under review the Constitution and Statutes of the Cathedral; and keeping the Cathedral Council informed of planned developments. The Bishop as Visitor is kept informed of developments by the Chapter.

Details of the members of Chapter, the Executive and the Minute Secretary that served during the year and subsequent to the year-end are noted as part of the legal and administrative information.

#### The Council

The Cathedral Council's function is to further and support the work of the Cathedral, to review and advise on the work of the Chapter, especially in terms of its direction and mission, the annual report and any other such matters which the Chapter wishes to submit to the Council.

- Land.
- Funds administered for the Central Board of Finance of the Church of England by CCLA Investment Management Limited.
- Investments in which the trustees may invest under the general power of Investment in the Trustee Act 2000.
- The improvement or development of property belonging to the Cathedral, except that endowment funds may not be used to improve or develop the Cathedral itself and its ancillary buildings.

### **Risk Management**

Risk assessments are the responsibility of the Chapter and are built into its annual schedule of business.

### Volunteers

The lifeblood of any cathedral is the dedicated service of the many volunteers across many areas of cathedral life. Here at Blackburn Cathedral, we are blessed with an amazing group of friends and other members of our Welcoming Team gathered from across the Diocese who tirelessly staff the Welcome Desk. We are very grateful also to our Cathedral Wardens, servers, stewards, singers, flower arrangers, bell ringers and Pastoral Care Team who visit the sick and housebound.

## OUR VISION

We continue to work at both being a healthy congregation and at being a resource for other churches.

The work with children and young people remains a high priority within the Cathedral's mission through its choirs; music outreach activity; curriculum-related school visits; and preparation for Confirmation and Holy Communion. We continue to see growth in the number of school visits to the Cathedral and a closer working relationship with the Diocesan Board of Education.

#### ACTIVITIES, ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

A sense of change and renewal at the Cathedral brought new vitality to the fulfilment of its vision during 2023. We gratefully thank the Dean for his energy and determination to lead the Cathedral towards a strong future that will include registration with the Charity Commission and the Cathedral's centenary.

#### WORSHIP AND SERVICE

The year began with the proclamation of Bishop Philip North as our 10<sup>th</sup> Diocesan bishop, and his installation took place with all due ceremony at a Eucharist of the Holy Spirit on 24 June. He has stated that he is committed to continuing the growth of the church in Lancashire, to the church being an everstronger voice for justice, and to placing children and young people at the heart of all that we do. A procession of young mini bishops during his installation, wearing individual paper mitres, was a lively symbol of this third objective.

Other special services included the Coronation Choral Evensong held on the Fifth Sunday of Easter and the day after the Coronation of HM The King, and a choral evensong on the Fifth Sunday after Trinity that was dedicated to Lord Shuttleworth. He and Lady Shuttleworth have been magnificent supporters of the Cathedral throughout his long Lord Lieutenancy.

The flower arrangers continue to enhance the beauty of the Cathedral and. receive many words of encouragement by congregation members and visitors. They are grateful for the donations they receive and for the discount by a local florist for displays that contribute to the Cathedral's offering of praise to God.

In the Canon Missioner's first full year in post, the development of the Cathedral congregations' discipleship has been a priority, with home bible study groups held throughout the year and two study courses in the autumn. Revd Canon James Lawrence also designed a sermon series for the clergy team on the Epistle to the Romans, chapters 5-8, and himself preached at parishes in Burnley and Accrington. There were three baptisms and five confirmations. A Refugee Week conference was hosted in the Crypt, and the Cathedral co-hosted a "Re-imagining living well" conference with the town at Ewood Park football ground, with Bishop James Newcombe of Carlisle as a speaker.

One important aspiration faltered. Canon Lawrence had proposed that Church House be investigated as the location for a Community Centre that would serve the needs of the town and become a hub for social action in Blackburn. He garnered widespread support for this idea from local charities and local government, and thirty volunteers spent a summer's day cleaning and clearing the building in preparation. Unfortunately, Church House presented structural problems that proved insurmountable, and the project stalled.

Other initiatives fared better. The Cathedral worked with a local company, R52 at Burnley, to develop the crucially important web site for a 2024 launch, alongside new interpretative signage designed to inform visitors better while provoking discussion about the Christian faith. Another highlight was the development of a Christian chaplaincy at Blackburn College for the first time in years, in partnership with St Luke's at Blackburn. A Contemporary Carol service was held at the campus in December.

The Music Department continues to grow from strength to strength under its Director, Mr John Robinson. The Revd Canon Gary O'Neill stepped down from his role as Interim Precentor in the autumn, giving an opportunity to put on record his achievements in many areas of the Cathedral's musical life. These include the choir's mixed top line with a broader and more demanding repertoire, a strong back row, changes in the positioning of liturgical furnishings to make music-making easier and less stressful, and successful live-streamed services. With his help, the Lantern Music Trust also got off the ground as a significant legacy for a future that looks bright with the appointment at the end of the year of Revd Dr Jenny Gaffin as permanent Canon Precentor. Canon O'Neill also led work on the Liturgical Plan, "Gathering Round the Table". The final report detailed all the liturgical arrangements during the life of the Cathedral and made recommendations about how they might work in the future, with a particular emphasis on the Sanctuary. The report was approved as work in progress by the Chapter in September.

The new music administrator, Ms Abigail Birch-Price, has brought both a Cambridge music degree and an MA in arts management. She is enthusiastic about women composers and organised events around International Women's Day from a tiny budget, as well as increasing the audiences at major music events through her use of social media. The junior choral scholars are increasingly assured, with one of them about to leave to read for a degree in music. The Cathedral youth choir continues to thrive under Ms Helen Davies, with new singers joining alongside ex-choristers. St Paul's Voices, the voluntary choir, has grown under the kind guidance of the organist in residence, Mr John Hosking, with people travelling significant distances to be involved. Dr John Bertalot continues to produce Music and More, the envy of the music world, and he has welcomed the revolution in streaming with open arms. Overall, the Director of Music finds joy in directing music in a situation where it is supported so keenly and so expertly.

The Ringing Master, Mr Ray Hutchings, was pleased to welcome new recruits to the tower. Three existing learners all scored quarter peals, and there were regular visitors from St Silas and Oswaldtwistle. A Cambridge S Major was rung for the Candlemas Eucharist and as a celebration of the life of Mr John Halliwell, former chorister and Ringing Master from 1957 to 1967, while a Plain Bob Major marked Mothering Sunday and the memory of Mrs Jean Barnes. There was open ringing for the Coronation in May and Steadman Doubles for the installation of Bishop Philip in June. These are just a few of the highlights of a year in which there was ringing on 45 Sundays, with well-supported Thursday practices.

The Education Department maintains a focus that reflects its important place within the missional life of the Cathedral. Visits are made from every educational level and age group. Mrs Sian Howell-Jones is in touch with Mr Iain Parkes, the new Diocesan Head of Education, and through him to the advisors. A contact has been made with a second mosque, and the floor was shared with a Jewish colleague from Manchester at a Blackburn primary school panel. The total number of visits and visitors has remained steady, while income has almost doubled. Feedback is strongly positive; for example, gratitude from one visit recalled the warm welcome and ideal introduction that led to an excellent trail, and to "tangible generosity in terms of the resources invested and the kind volunteers who staffed the activities".

#### GOVERNANCE AND FINANCE

A key task for the Chapter throughout the year was to undertake the work necessary for the Cathedral to fulfil the Charity Commission provisions for the purposes of the Cathedrals Measure 2021, and to become the sole governing body of the institution. This endeavour included intensive discussion of the template constitution and statutes provided for the Chapter's consideration, with valuable guidance and facilitation from Mr David Bilton of Newcastle Cathedral, followed by a re-consideration of major policy documents and the establishment of a new committee structure. The Council held its final meeting on 16 November, at the conclusion of which its chairman signed a document that laid it down, and the full and final submission for Charity Commission registration was completed by the end of the year.

The Chapter was delighted to welcome Mr Ian White in February as the new Chief Operating Officer and Chapter Clerk. Not only has he set high standards of effectiveness and efficiency across all areas of Cathedral operations and governance, but he is also welcomed as a world-class singer in the choir, with a passion for choral music that he passes on to younger singers.

Other staffing changes included the resignation of Mr Mark Pickering, a well-known face to many as the Head Virger for over twenty years. External advertisement and interview led to the appointment of Mr Alex Barnes as his successor.

Mr White's arrival allowed various initiatives to move forward with renewed energy. He facilitated the Chapter's away day on 5 July that was spent in an examination of the Cathedral's strategic vision in the context of its approaching centenary in 2026. Every facet of the Cathedral's mission and operations came under scrutiny, with a consequential Strategy Plan for 2024-27, discussed and approved by the Chapter, that sets the agenda across all the areas of its business. The Church Commissioners agreed to fund a campaign manager to work up the funding and support for the centenary, an appointment that was approved by the end of the year. The Cathedral and the Diocese were able to share their approaches to a centenary that marks the foundation of both Diocese and Cathedral, with the intention that the events for this special occasion will be jointly agreed and synchronised.

The report of the Lessons Learned Review, commissioned by Bishop Julian Henderson, was issued in October 2022. Procedural issues delayed consideration of its findings but following a meeting at Bishop's House with Bishop Philip North on 5 October, the Chapter was able to discuss its findings and make a response, jointly with Bishop Philip, that was approved for publication. The statement apologises unreservedly for the pain and distress of failures in safeguarding practices across Blackburn Diocese and at Blackburn Cathedral over an extended period, and makes recommendations about: (1) commitment to robust whistleblowing; (2) strengthening of Chapter governance structures, policies and procedures; (3) cultural change towards more effective and efficient safeguarding; (4) contributions towards work within the Church of England leading improved national policies; and (5) investment in partnerships with relevant statutory and other organisations. The statement concludes by a renewed commitment to the Seven Principles of Public Life and to making the Cathedral a safer place for all and the joyful proclamation of the good news about Jesus Christ. The full text is on the web site.

Ms Carolyn Johnson took on the independent chairing of the Cathedral Safeguarding Management Group, with Ms Jenny Price continuing as Cathedral Safeguarding Officer. Ms Catherine Smith, the new Diocesan Safeguarding Adviser and a member, with the Dean, of the Diocesan Safeguarding Advisory Panel, was welcomed. Items on the group's agenda, besides the Lessons Learned Review, have included the development of national safeguarding standards, the updating and completion of the contract for Cathedral Safeguarding Advisers, and the drafting of a Low-Level Concerns policy. Because part of the group's work included the national Independent Inquiry into Child Sexual Abuse, it explored the impact of Recommendation 8, about the strengthening of Cathedral Safeguarding Advisers to become officers, independently supervised by a member of the National Safeguarding Team. The group also looked at Recommendation 1, that proposes the Church of England should continue its programme of independent safeguarding audits. The Cathedral's last audit was in 2019 and preparation of a Safeguarding Strategy Plan for the next audit in 2025 has already begun.

The Cathedral's Finance Committee held regular meetings throughout the year with reports to the Council that enabled careful discussions of key issues to take place. Because some long-standing debts have been discharged, the level of interest payments has shown a welcome decline, and while the generation of income remains as a major issue, the institution's finances are stable and no longer prone to unwelcome surprises. Checks and Grays achieved a full year of bookings by external organisation for the first time, a milestone that together with internal event income gave additional confidence and provides a base line for further growth. Overall café revenue increased, and challenging budgets were reached, with ongoing efforts to increase profitability further. Funding was secured for an outdoor courtyard development that includes a canopied area, bicycle racks and a small playground, giving back to the community as well as drawing in more customers.

The Friends of Blackburn Cathedral held six meetings, including an annual general meeting in July that concluded with a choral evensong. At the October Council meeting Bishop Philip was presented with a copy of a 1695 map by Robert Marsden of the area covered by the Diocese, and on Advent Sunday the Friends hosted a reception for all the congregation who attended. The Friends donated over £27,000 to the Cathedral during the year, including further funding for the restoration of 'Healing of the Nation', streaming equipment and improvement of the public announcement sound and loop system, the purchase of banqueting tables and chairs for use in the Crypt, and donations to the flower arrangers. A display board that will show all the Friends' donations from 2012 onwards is being organised.

Considerable progress was made during the year on the Cathedral's fabric, and the Chapter was pleased to welcome Ms Emma Birkett in October to chair the Fabric Advisory Committee. Ms Louise Priestman, Cathedral Architect, undertook a thorough quinquennial inspection of the main Cathedral and Crypt, leaving Church House and Cathedral Court still to follow. She has been working with Purcell and John Turner Construction to resolve the remaining defects in Cathedral Court. Church House remains empty, with attempts to find tenants hampered by rental market conditions and the need to upgrade the premises. Works undertaken during the year included biocide treatment to improve the safety of the ledger stone paving in the Garth, steps taken to manage the damp and water ingress in the Columbarium, clearance of long-accumulated rubbish to allow better assessment of fabric condition and future opportunities, and study by a part-time voluntary archivist of the Cathedral's records and their condition.

The Chapter made an on-site visit to the area of the Crypt known as the Builders' Yard and plans for its future use as a flexible space for entertainments, events and exhibitions have been drawn up. CBG Lighting Perceptions made proposals for improved internal and safer LED lighting that were signed off in principle by the Chapter, subject to funding. A specialist inspection of the Corona resulted in some immediate pointing repairs to the pinnacles and a recognition that a fuller programme will be needed over the next five years. The Cathedral achieved Eco Church Bronze status in September, and a sharp increase in energy prices has necessitated an overhaul of the Cathedral's management systems to improve efficiency. At the end of the year the Chapter welcomed the financial support by the local council for the installation of a Changing Places facility.

The Cathedral is thus poised for a programme of forthcoming works that will bring the Crypt more fully into the life of the institution, complete a liturgical re-ordering that includes improved lighting and sound, and bring the Cathedral to a high standard of renewal and repair for a sustainable future.

### FINANCIAL REVIEW

The results for the year are shown in the Consolidated Statement of Financial Activities. During the year there was net unrestricted income, including gains on investments, of £8,575 (2022: £4,365). The total unrestricted funds were £1,070,315 (2022: £961,740).

The restricted funds showed net income, including gains on investments, of £632,851 (2022: net expenditure of £72,928) with income largely consisting of grants from the Church Commissioners. With transfers between funds total restricted funds were £533,406 (2022: £318,555).

The endowment funds showed net income, including losses on investments, of £649,904 (2022: £Nil). At 31 December 2023, endowment funds totalled £3,135,811 (2022: £2,167,907).

Losses recognised on the revaluation of investments across all funds amounted to £1,828 (2022: £60,103).

The net cash outflow from operating activities was £161,371 (2022: inflow £147,212). Cash reserves at the year-end were £478,542 (2022: £354,749).

### **Going Concern**

The Church Commissioners paid all 2023 grants in full in April 2023, with payment of the 2024 full year grant being made in January 2024.

In consideration of all of the above, Chapter do not consider there to be a material uncertainty relating to going concern in particular due to having general funds of £934,348 (2022: £732,581), including investments of £222,064 (2022: £204,702) in the general fund that can be drawn down if required, to support operations.

### **Reserves Policy**

Determining the level of free reserves and designated reserves the Cathedral needs to hold is an important part of Chapter's financial management and forward financial planning. Reserves levels that are too high may tie up money unnecessarily and limit the amount spent on charitable activities, reducing the potential benefit the Cathedral can provide. Reserve levels that are too low not only could impact the Cathedral's long-term solvency, but also the Cathedral could face difficulty in meeting its day-to-day expenditure commitments. Chapter's aim is to build all its funds, including its reserves held in unrestricted funds, to levels sufficient to address the Cathedral's long-term sustainability and perpetual need to maintain and preserve the Cathedral's heritage and fabric.

This aim is set in the context of the Cathedral's stated vision and priorities. This means establishing sufficient funds to develop and grow the Cathedral of the future, alongside retaining sufficient readily accessible reserves to meet the financial liabilities inherent in running and maintaining an historic Cathedral, as well as other Cathedral properties. The Cathedral's reserves not only need to cover short-term financial volatility and ongoing financial liabilities, but also act as a funding source for specific projects or development activity that is considered likely to generate long-term strategic and financial benefit.

The nature of the Cathedral's long-term financial commitments and its related income profile means it invests part of both its unrestricted and restricted funds to generate a financial return, in essence holding income as quasi-capital. Chapter is confident this is in the Cathedral's best interests.

Chapter have considered an appropriate level of unrestricted reserves in the short term as at 31 December 2023 to be at least £450,000. This is based on an estimate of ongoing unrestricted expenditure for a minimum one-year period. The current value of the unrestricted general funds as at 31 December 2023 is £910,300 with an additional £160,015 in designated funds relating to the Cathedral and Cathedral Court fixtures and fittings.

#### **Investment Policy**

During 2019, Chapter transferred investment funds from St James' Place to CCLA. Chapter's policy is to hold these funds to generate income and long-term capital growth.

Any investment funds held by Chapter that may be required in the foreseeable future are held in UK Bank Deposit funds with immediate access to the capital.

### Total Return on Investment Property

No major expenditure has been incurred during the year in respect of the existing investment property.

## Report of the Fabric Advisory Committee

2023 was a busy and productive year for the Fabric Advisory Committee (FAC) at Blackburn Cathedral and one of considerable change.

The committee accepted the resignation of the FAC Chair Richard Prest who had given the cathedral over 20 years of service. The Dean and FAC committee were sorry to see Richard step back after such a long and successful role at the cathedral and held a lunch to thank him for his valued contribution. Following the resignation of Richard, Emma Birkett was elected as the new FAC chair.

Alan Croston also stood down from FAC after 27 years of service and again the FAC and Dean expressed their thanks for such a valued service over the years.

The cathedral also said goodbye to Canon Gary O'Neill who retired after four years at Blackburn. FAC had worked closely with Gary in 2023 on developing and signing off the cathedral's Liturgical Plan. Gary's work in this area was hugely helpful to FAC in enabling long term planning and prioritisation of work.

The cathedral welcomed Ian White as Chapter Clerk and COO to their team and his work with the FAC has been invaluable. Mr. White acts as the Secretary to the FAC.

In 2023 Ted Comer from Chester Cathedral joined FAC and his experience and commitment are very welcome, he is already a valued member of the group.

The new Cathedral Architect, Louise Priestman has had a very successful first full year in post. The quality of her work, the expertise of her guidance and her commitment are inspiring and both the Dean and FAC are very grateful for all her work to date.

In June 2023 Louise Priestman and Ian White attended the National FAC conference in York which was a very useful event.

In October 2023 Tom Ashley from CFCE came to the FAC meeting and gave the new team a very helpful introduction to the CFCE application process and how the FAC could build its relationship with the CFCE. Tom advised on the make-up of FAC and in particular suggested that we should try and recruit someone with expertise in environmental sustainability. FAC agreed with this suggestion but have yet to find anyone suitable. The search continues.

In terms of works to the fabric of the cathedral there have been several successful interventions in 2023. These were all ably managed by the Cathedral Architect and include:

- > The delivery of a much-needed Changing Places facility, externally funded
- > Further precinct rectifications
- ➢ Electrical testing
- > The leasing of an external area to Wetherspoons
- Pinnacle inspections and remedial works
- > Removal and making good of south side car park retaining walls
- Works to the Columbarium to rectify damp issue
- Planning for further work in the Crypt

This work and the new team have placed the cathedral in a strong position to approach 2024.

## Notes to the Accounts

### **1.** Accounting policies

### **1.1.** Basis of preparation of financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102). The Cathedral and its subsidiaries are a public benefit group for the purposes of FRS 102 and therefore the Cathedral also prepared its financial statements in accordance with the Accounting and Reporting by English Anglican Cathedrals as specified by the Church Commissioners in preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102).

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention as modified to include the revaluation of property and investments. The consolidated financial statements incorporate all assets and liabilities and income and expenditure of Blackburn Cathedral Developments, as per that company's unaudited financial statements.

The consolidated financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis.

The Chapter do not consider there to be a material uncertainty relating to going concern in particular due to having general funds of £910,300 (2022: £732,581), including investments of £222,064 (2022: £204,702) in the general fund that can be drawn down if required, to support operations.

#### 1.2. Funds

Funds are split between endowment, restricted and unrestricted funds. Movements on these funds are summarized in Notes 18, 19, 20 and 21.

Endowment funds are those where there is no power to convert the capital to income.

Restricted funds are funds subject to specific conditions imposed by the donor or by specific terms of a trust deed or other legal measure.

### **1.3 Property and investments**

Investment property and Investments are included in the financial statements at market value. Realised and unrealised gains and losses are reported in the Consolidated Statement of Financial Activities.

### 1.4 Non-Investment property and Equipment and plant

Property for Cathedral use is included at latest valuation and, after considering the residual value, is depreciated at 2% straight line over its expected useful life. The Cathedral Court is not depreciated as the residual value in 50 years is expected to be at least that of its current market value as the Chapter will be running a strict capital maintenance programme on the property.

Property in the course of construction was included at cost and no depreciation has been charged. The cost has been transferred to the appropriate asset categories upon the completion of the project.

Equipment and plant are included at cost and are depreciated at 10% or 20% straight line over their expected useful lives. The Chapter has adopted a capitalisation limit of £1,000 per separately identifiable asset.

#### 1.5 Stock

Stocks are valued at the lower of cost and net realizable value, after making due allowance for slow moving items.

Notes to the Accounts (cont'd)

### 1. Accounting policies (cont'd)

#### **1.6** Incoming resources

Donations, legacies, and grants are included in the financial statements on a receivable basis when there is entitlement to the funds, the receipt is probable, and the amount can be measured reliably. A debtor is included for Gift Aid reclaimable.

#### 1.7 Grants receivable

Grants receivable which are subject to conditions or restrictions are credited to the restricted fund in the Consolidated Statement of Financial Activities, depending on the category of expenditure incurred to which they relate as soon as they are received or become receivable. The related expenditure incurred is charged to the restricted fund in the Consolidated Statement of Financial Activities as appropriate.

If a grant has been received or is receivable and either the related expenditure has not been incurred or the conditions of the grant have not been satisfied, then the grant is carried forward in restricted funds in the balance sheet. If expenditure has been incurred prior to the receipt of the related grant, but with other conditions satisfied, then the grant receivable is credited to the Consolidated Statement of Financial Activities and carried forward as a debtor in the balance sheet.

#### 1.8 Costs of raising funds

Costs of raising funds comprises costs of attracting voluntary income and costs of trading for fundraising purposes.

#### **1.9** Expenditure on mission

Expenditure on mission comprise costs of the Cathedral's ministry, upkeep of the Cathedral fabric and precincts, education and outreach, and community, parish, and congregation costs.

#### 1.10. Support costs

Support costs are allocated to expense categories on the basis of the direct costs incurred in that expense category.

#### 1.11. Repairs

Repairs, restoration, and maintenance are written off as incurred within Cathedral and precincts upkeep.

#### 1.12. Pensions

The Chapter contributes to a pension scheme for the clergy staff administered by the Church of England Pension Scheme. This scheme operates as an occupational pension scheme and contributions, at a rate determined having regard to actuarial advice, are paid into a separate fund in the trusteeship of the Church of England Pensions Board. Benefits arising from pensionable service are provided from that fund. The contributions to the fund by the Cathedral are charged to the Consolidated Statement of Financial Activities as incurred, as the scheme is a multi-employer scheme, and it is not possible to identify the assets and liabilities relating to the Cathedral. These contributions are funded by a grant from The Church of England Church Commissioners.

The Chapter also contributes to personal pension schemes for selected employees, these costs are charged to the Consolidated Statement of Financial Activities as incurred.

From 1 January 2016 Chapter operated an auto-enrolment pension scheme, in addition to those previously mentioned, for all eligible employees. The costs of this scheme are charged to the Consolidated Statement of Financial Activities as incurred.

### 1. Accounting policies (cont'd)

#### **1.13.** Third party and non-cash receipts and payments

Where amounts are payable on behalf of the Cathedral by third parties, for example, the Church Commissioners, these are disclosed under both income and expenditure in the Consolidated Statement of Financial Activities

#### 1.14. Taxation

The Cathedral Chapter is a statutory exempt charity under the Charities Act 2011 and, as such, is entitled to claim exemption from the charge to tax on income and capital gains as stated in section 258 TCGA 1992. Accordingly, with the exception of Value Added Tax and Employer's National Insurance, no liability to taxation arises.

Income is shown net of value added tax. Input value added tax is reclaimable on a percentage basis subject to partial exemption rules. All irrecoverable value added tax is included under the appropriate classification of expenditure, irrecoverable VAT on fixed asset purchases is capitalised within the cost of the asset.

#### 1.15. Donated assets and services

As stated in the Annual Report, the Cathedral very much appreciates the donation of time and services by Friends and other volunteers. It has not proved possible, however, to provide a monetary valuation on these services to incorporate the same into these accounts.

#### 1.16. Heritage Assets

The Cathedral holds a number of heritage assets with historic and artistic value. The nature and scale of the collection and inventory belonging to the Chapter of Blackburn include:

- The Medieval Pax
- Blackburn Cathedral Archives
- Blackburn Cathedral wall monuments
- Blackburn Cathedral 20th Century Art works
- Mark Jalland's 'The Healing of the Nations'
- The Whalley Seals and Misericords
- Other artefacts, including the Saxon Hammer and ancient manuscripts.

The Cathedral's policy for the acquisition, preservation, management, and disposal of heritage assets is described in Section 24(1) of the Care of Cathedrals Measure 2011.

Note 12 of these financial statements gives further details regarding the age and history of the Cathedral, together with the insured value of the Cathedral buildings and its content.

The Cathedral inventory comprises of purchased and donated items over several centuries and these are retained by the Cathedral for religious, architectural, archaeological, artistic, and historic interest.

Valuation of the Cathedral Inventory is not deemed necessary for the day-to-day operation of the Cathedral. The quantity of items and the diverse nature of the collection would make valuation prohibitively expensive compared with the additional benefits derived by the Cathedral and users of the financial statements. As a result, no value is reported for these assets in the Balance Sheet.

Expenditure which is required to preserve or prevent further deterioration of individual items, is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities when it is incurred.

### 1.17 Note on the May Fletcher Abbott Legacy

Given the size of the legacy and its impact on the 2023 Accounts, a full note on the circumstances is justified.

May Abbott died in the 1970's and left her estate in trust to her niece Jean Mitchell for her lifetime with the remainder of the estate to be passed to the Cathedral on her death. The remainder was to be split 50/50 between a Blackburn Cathedral Building Fund and a permanent endowment fund, the income from which could be treated as unrestricted.

Jean Mitchell died on 29 March 2022. On this date the trust was in the form of investments held by Hedley & Co and was valued at £1,166,626.11 (Investments £1,142,183.79 plus a cash account £24,442.32) with legacy liabilities of £27,544.62. The investments were split into two (Trust No 1 and Trust No 2) and Trust No 2 was sold in July 2022. The liabilities were paid from the cash account and the remaining proceeds (after further solicitor's costs) were transferred to the cathedral on 19 July 2023.

The total legacy has been recorded in the accounts at the value on date of death less liabilities and split as follows: Endowment £574,149.75; Restricted Building Fund £564,931.74. The restricted building fund was then used to repay a £418,000 loan from the Diocese.

A Deed was signed on 13th July 2023 appointing The Chapter as Trustees for the Endowment. The capital cannot be spent unless the Trustees applied for a legal change to the terms of the Trust. Hedley & Co have been retained as investment managers and pass the income to the Cathedral quarterly. This income is unrestricted.

The Cathedral Court project was completed in 2017 and funded from various sources including the sale of endowed property and Government grants. The Repair Fund will be used for repairs to the cathedral building and fabrics, including some related professional fees.

The Chapter also contributes to defined contribution stakeholder pension schemes for selected employees in addition to those disclosed in Note 8. The contributions for the year totaled £29,405 (2022: £40,189) and there were no contributions outstanding at the year end.

#### 23. Related entities

Blackburn Cathedral Developments, a company limited by guarantee, is controlled by the Chapter. The results and balance sheet of the company are consolidated in these accounts. The company made a deficit of £9,563 (2022: £20,540) during the year and had net liabilities of £30,103 (2022: £20,540) at 31 December 2023. The accounts of the company include income from the Cathedral of £nil (2022: £2,000). Included within debtors on the Chapter's own balance sheet is £145,350 (2022: creditor £263,948) owed by Blackburn Cathedral Developments.

Blackburn Cathedral Enterprises Limited is a company limited by shares and is controlled by the Chapter. The results and balance sheet of the company are consolidated in these accounts. The company made a surplus of £27,368 (2022: defect of £21,904) during the year and had net liabilities of £31,029 (2022: £58,397) at 31 December 2023. The accounts of the company include income from the Cathedral of £321,311 (2022: £163,847). Included within debtors on the Chapter's own balance sheet is £64,163 (2022: £59,750) owed from Blackburn Cathedral Enterprises Limited.

The Chapter also paid £19,280 to a company connected to a member of the Cathedral Chapter for accountancy services (2022: £2,525).

The Friends of Blackburn Cathedral and Blackburn Cathedral Trust operate independently of the Chapter but are wholly for the benefit of the Cathedral. Income receivable from these entities in the financial statements.
