Welcome

This is a very special day and the culmination of many years of prayer and preparation. Christians believe that God calls every single one of us and equips us for our own unique tasks in his world. One of these roles is as an ordained deacon. For this we gather as God's family and we ask for God's Holy Spirit – the Spirit of Jesus – to fill them for this task. 'Come Holy Spirit' is a very ancient prayer indeed. Please feel free to join in with as much or as little of the service as you wish (all the instructions you need are in this booklet). Our hope and prayer is that you will sense the presence of God's Spirit in this time, confident that you have your own unique calling, no matter your age or story.

Children

Children are most welcome at this service. Please do not shush them or feel any embarrassment if they are noisy or wriggly. Jesus said they are the most important people in the Kingdom of God. We are conscious it is a long service (90 minutes or so), so there is a 25-30 minute slot early in the service, where children aged 5-11 are welcome to go to supervised groups in the conference suite, if parental permission is given. (See further instructions in the order of service).

Communion

This celebrates the last meal that Jesus had with his disciples; we believe it is a foretaste of the heavenly banquet. Throughout the ages, people have often found that they meet Jesus in a special way in this time. You are very welcome to receive Holy Communion if you wish to do so. Please follow the guidance of the stewards during the distribution of communion. If you wish to receive a blessing instead of the bread and wine, please indicate this to the priest distributing the wafers, either with words or by holding your service booklet in your hands. Gluten free wafers are available at every communion point. If you prefer to receive the bread but not the wine, please feel free to do so.

Toilets

An accessible toilet is available at Cathedral level in the South Porch to the left of the main doors when looking towards them. Please ask the stewards for assistance. Other toilets are in the Cathedral Crypt, accessed by the lift and stairs in the Temple Gallery which is off the South Transept. Please follow the signs or ask a Virger or Steward for directions.

Loop system

The Cathedral has a loop induction system which can be used for both speech and music. Please use the appropriate setting on your hearing aid.

Preface

The Church of England is part of the One, Holy, Catholic and Apostolic Church, worshipping the one true God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit. It professes the faith uniquely revealed in the Holy Scriptures and set forth in the catholic creeds, which faith the Church is called upon to proclaim afresh in each generation. Led by the Holy Spirit, it has borne witness to Christian truth in its historic formularies, the Thirty-Nine Articles of Religion, *The Book of Common Prayer* and the Ordering of Bishops, Priests and Deacons. In the declaration you are about to make, will you affirm your loyalty to this inheritance of faith as your inspiration and guidance under God in bringing the grace and truth of Christ to this generation and making him known to those in your care?

Declaration of Assent

I, N, do so affirm, and accordingly declare my belief in the faith which is revealed in the Holy Scriptures and set forth in the catholic creeds and to which the historic formularies of the Church of England bear witness; and in public prayer and administration of the sacraments, I will use only the forms of service which are authorised or allowed by Canon.

Oath of Allegiance

I, N, do swear that I will be faithful and bear true allegiance to His Majesty, King Charles III, his Heirs and Successors, according to Law;

Oath of Canonical Obedience

I, N, do swear by almighty God that I will pay true and canonical obedience to the Bishop of Blackburn and Successors in all things lawful and honest;

The Introduction

The Bishop invites the congregation to sit and introduces the service

God calls his people to follow Christ, and forms us into a royal priesthood, a holy nation, to declare the wonderful deeds of him who has called us out of darkness into his marvellous light.

The Church is the Body of Christ, the people of God and the dwelling-place of the Holy Spirit. In baptism the whole Church is summoned to witness to God's love and to work for the coming of his kingdom.

To serve this royal priesthood, God has given a variety of ministries. Deacons are ordained so that the people of God may be better equipped to make Christ known. Theirs is a life of visible self-giving. Christ is the pattern of their calling and their commission; as he washed the feet of his disciples, so they must wash the feet of others.

The Presentation

When the ordinands have been presented, the Bishop asks these questions, to which the Director of Ministry responds

Have those whose duty it is to know these ordinands and examine them found them to be of godly life and sound learning?

DoM They have.

Do they believe them to be duly called to serve God in this ministry? They do.

The Bishop turns to the ordinands and those to be welcomed into the Church of England and says

Do you believe that God is calling you to this ministry?

I do so believe.

The Bishop says

I invite the Archdeacon to confirm that the ordinands and those to be welcomed into the Church of England have taken the necessary oaths and made the Declaration of Assent.

The Archdeacon says

They have duly taken the oath of allegiance to the Sovereign and the oath of canonical obedience to the Bishop. They have affirmed and declared their belief in 'the faith which is revealed in the Holy Scriptures and set forth in the catholic creeds and to which the historic formularies of the Church of England bear witness'.

Bishop Jill and Bishop Joe invite any children who wish to join the supervised children's work in the conference suite to join them at the front. We ask parents to accompany them and sign them in before leaving them for about 20 minutes. They will return after the sermon in time to see the ordination.

The deacon says

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke Glory to you, O Lord.

Jesus continued: "There was a man who had two sons. The younger one said to his father, 'Father, give me my share of the estate.' So he divided his property between them. "Not long after that, the younger son got together all he had, set off for a distant country and there squandered his wealth in wild living. After he had spent everything, there was a severe famine in that whole country, and he began to be in need. So he went and hired himself out to a citizen of that country, who sent him to his fields to feed pigs. He longed to fill his stomach with the pods that the pigs were eating, but no one gave him anything. "When he came to his senses, he said, 'How many of my father's hired servants have food to spare, and here I am starving to death! I will set out and go back to my father and say to him: Father, I have sinned against heaven and against you. I am no longer worthy to be called your son; make me like one of your hired servants.' So he got up and went to his father. "But while he was still a long way off, his father saw him and was filled with compassion for him; he ran to his son, threw his arms around him and kissed him. "The son said to him, 'Father, I have sinned against heaven and against you. I am no longer worthy to be called your son.' "But the father said to his servants, 'Quick! Bring the best robe and put it on him. Put a ring on his finger and sandals on his feet. Bring the fattened calf and kill it. Let's have a feast and celebrate. For this son of mine was dead and is alive again; he was lost and is found.' So they began to celebrate. "Meanwhile, the older son was in the field. When he came near the house, he heard music and dancing. So he called one of the servants and asked him what was going on. 'Your brother has come,' he replied, 'and your father has killed the fattened calf because he has him back safe and sound.' "The older brother became angry and refused to go in. So his father went out and pleaded with him. But he answered his father, 'Look! All these years I've been slaving for you and never disobeyed your orders. Yet you never gave me even a young goat so I could celebrate with my friends. But when this son of yours who has squandered your property with prostitutes comes home, you kill the fattened calf for him!" "My son," the father said, 'you are always with me, and everything I have is yours. But we had to celebrate and be glad, because this brother of yours was dead and is alive again; he was lost and is found."

Sermon

The Liturgy of Ordination

The Declarations

The candidates stand before the Bishop, who addresses the congregation

Deacons are called to work with the Bishop and the priests with whom they serve as heralds of Christ's kingdom. They are to proclaim the gospel in word and deed, as agents of God's purposes of love. They are to serve the community in which they are set, bringing to the Church the needs and hopes of all the people. They are to work with their fellow members in searching out the poor and weak, the sick and lonely and those who are oppressed and powerless, reaching into the forgotten corners of the world, that the love of God may be made visible.

Deacons share in the pastoral ministry of the Church and in leading God's people in worship. They preach the word and bring the needs of the world before the Church in intercession. They accompany those searching for faith and bring them to baptism. They assist in administering the sacraments; they distribute communion and minister to the sick and housebound.

Deacons are to seek nourishment from the Scriptures; they are to study them with God's people, that the whole Church may be equipped to live out the gospel in the world. They are to be faithful in prayer, expectant and watchful for the signs of God's presence, as he reveals his kingdom among us.

The Bishop addresses the candidates

We trust that you are fully determined, by the grace of God, to give yourself wholly to his service, that you may draw his people into that new life which God has prepared for those who love him.

And now, in order that we may know your mind and purpose, you must make the declarations we put to you.

Do you accept the Holy Scriptures as revealing all things necessary for eternal salvation through faith in Jesus Christ?

Candidates I do so accept them.

Will you be diligent in prayer, in reading Holy Scripture, and in all studies that will deepen your faith and fit you to bear witness to the truth of the gospel?

Candidates By the help of God, I will.

Do you believe the doctrine of the Christian faith as the Church of England has received it, and in your ministry will you expound and teach it?

Candidates I believe it and will so do.

Will you strive to make the love of Christ known through word and example, and have a particular care for those in need?

Candidates By the help of God, I will.

Will you be a faithful servant in the household of God, after the example of Christ, who came not to be served but to serve?

Candidates By the help of God, I will.

Will you endeavour to fashion your own life and that of your household according to the way of Christ, that you may be a pattern and example to Christ's people?

Candidates By the help of God, I will.

Will you work with your fellow servants in the gospel for the sake of the kingdom of God?

Candidates By the help of God, I will.

Will you accept the discipline of this Church and give due respect to those in authority?

Candidates By the help of God, I will.

Will you then, in the strength of the Holy Spirit, continually stir up the gift of God that is in you, to grow in holiness and grace?

Candidates By the help of God, I will.

The congregation stands and the candidates turn and face them. The Bishop continues

Brothers and sisters, you have heard how great is the charge that these ordinands are ready to undertake, and you have heard their declarations. Is it now your will that they should be ordained?

It is.

Will you continually pray for them?

We will.

Will you uphold and encourage them in their ministry?

We will.

The candidates turn back to face the Bishop, who continues addressing them

In the name of our Lord, we bid you remember the greatness of the trust that is now to be committed to your charge. Remember always with thanksgiving that the treasure now to be entrusted to you is Christ's own flock, bought by the shedding of his blood on the cross. It is to him that you will render account for your stewardship of his people.

You cannot bear the weight of this calling in your own strength, but only by the grace and power of God. Pray therefore that your heart may daily be enlarged and your understanding of the Scriptures enlightened.

Pray earnestly for the gift of the Holy Spirit.

The candidates and congregation kneel (if you are able) and silence is kept.

The Bishop intones the first line and then everyone sings the Veni Creator



Come, Holy Ghost, our souls inspire, and lighten with celestial fire; thou the anointing Spirit art, who dost thy sevenfold gifts impart. Thy blessèd unction from above is comfort, life, and fire of love; enable with perpetual light the dullness of our blinded sight.

For Charles our King, for the leaders of the nations, and for all in authority, let us pray to the Lord.



Remembering all who have gone before us in faith, and in communion with St Mary, St Paul, and all the saints, we commit ourselves, one another, and our whole life to Christ our God;

to you, O Lord.



The Ordination Prayer

The congregation sits. The candidates continue to kneel before the Bishop, who stands to pray

We praise and glorify you, almighty Father, because in your infinite love you have formed throughout the world a holy people for your own possession, a royal priesthood, a universal Church.

We praise and glorify you because you sent your only Son Jesus Christ to take the form of a slave; he humbled himself for our sake, and in obedience accepted death, even death on a cross.

We praise and glorify you because in every age you send your Spirit to fill those whom you have chosen, to equip your holy people for the work of ministry, for the building up of the body of Christ.

And now we give you thanks that you have called these your servants, whom we ordain in your name, to share as deacons in the ministry of the gospel of Christ.

Therefore, Father, through Christ our Lord we pray:

Here the Bishop lays hands on the head of each ordinand, saying

Send down the Holy Spirit on your servant *N* for the office and work of a deacon in your Church.

Through your Spirit, heavenly Father, give these your servants grace and power to fulfil their ministry.

Make them faithful to serve and constant in advancing your gospel in the world. May they follow the example of Jesus Christ your Son, who washed the feet of his disciples, and set the needs of others before his own. May their life be disciplined and holy, their words declare your love and their actions reveal your glory, that your people may walk with them in the way of truth and be made ready for the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ, to whom, with you and your Holy Spirit, belong glory and honour, worship and praise, now and for ever. Amen.

Reception into the Priestly Ministry of the Church of England

The Bishop addresses those being welcomed into the Church of England, who stand

Jesse and Joseph, today we are glad to mark the beginning of your formal ministry as a priest in the Church of England. The Church of England recognises and affirms the ordination which you received in the Anglican province of Kwara and the Anglican Province of Alexandria. As your ministry now continues in the Church of England, I ask you to reaffirm your fidelity to this church and to recommit yourself to your ordination vows.

Do you acknowledge the Church of England as part of the one, holy, catholic and apostolic Church?

I do.

Do you accept the teaching, discipline and authority of the Church of England?

I do.

At your ordination as a deacon, you received the yoke of Christ, who came not to be served but to serve. Will you continue faithfully in this ministry, to build up God's people in his truth and serve them in his name?

By the help of God, I will.

At your ordination to the priesthood, you took authority to watch over and care for God's people, to absolve and bless them in his name, to proclaim the gospel of salvation, and to minister the sacraments of his New Covenant. Will you continue as a faithful steward of the mysteries of God, preaching the gospel of Christ and ministering his holy sacraments?

By the help of God, I will.

May they be a sign of your presence in our world; channels of the Holy Spirit; and agents of Christ's love. 

Holy, holy, holy, Lord God of hosts, heaven and earth are full of thy glory. Glory be to thee, O Lord most high. Amen.

We praise and bless you, loving Father, through Jesus Christ, our Lord; and as we obey his command, send your Holy Spirit, that broken bread and wine outpoured may be for us the body and blood of your dear Son.

On the night before he died he had supper with his friends and, taking bread, he praised you.

Drink this, all of you; this is my blood of the new covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins.

Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me.

So Father, we remember all that Jesus did, in him we plead with confidence his sacrifice made once for all upon the cross.

Bringing before you the bread of life and cup of salvation, we proclaim his death and resurrection until he comes in glory.

The Deacon says

Great is the mystery of faith: Christ has died,

Christ is risen, Christ will come again. Lord of all life, help us to work together for that day when your kingdom comes and justice and mercy will be seen in all the earth. Look with favour on your people, gather us in your loving arms and bring us with Mary, Paul, and all the saints to feast at your table in heaven.

Through Christ, and with Christ and in Christ, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all honour and glory are yours, O loving Father, for ever and ever.
