Welcome

This is a very special day and the culmination of many years of prayer and preparation. Christians believe that God calls every single one of us and equips us for our own unique tasks in his world. One of these roles is as an ordained priest (or presbyter). For this we gather as God's family and we ask for God's Holy Spirit – the Spirit of Jesus – to fill them for this task. 'Come Holy Spirit' is a very ancient prayer indeed. Please feel free to join in with as much or as little of the service as you wish (all the instructions you need are in this booklet). Our hope and prayer is that you will sense the presence of God's Spirit in this time, confident that you have your own unique calling, no matter your age or story.

Children

Children are most welcome at this service. Please do not shush them or feel any embarrassment if they are noisy or wriggly. Jesus said they are the most important people in the Kingdom of God. We are conscious it is a long service (90 minutes or so), so there is a 25-30 minute slot early in the service, where children aged 5-11 are welcome to go to supervised groups in the conference suite, if parental permission is given. This will be introduced by Philip North, Bishop of Blackburn (see further instructions in the order of service).

Communion

This celebrates the last meal that Jesus had with his disciples; we believe it is a foretaste of the heavenly banquet. Throughout the ages, people have often found that they meet Jesus in a special way in this time. You are very welcome to receive Holy Communion if you wish to do so. Please follow the guidance of the stewards during the distribution of communion. If you wish to receive a blessing instead of the bread and wine, please indicate this to the priest distributing the wafers, either with words or by holding your service booklet in your hands. Gluten free wafers are available at every communion point. If you prefer to receive the bread but not the wine, please feel free to do so.

Toilets

An accessible toilet is available at Cathedral level in the South Porch to the left of the main doors when looking towards them. Please ask the stewards for assistance. Other toilets are in the Cathedral Crypt, accessed by the lift and stairs in the Temple Gallery which is off the South Transept. Please follow the signs or ask a Virger or Steward for directions.

Loop system

The Cathedral has a loop induction system which can be used for both speech and music. Please use the appropriate setting on your hearing aid.

Revd Christopher Hegg. Chris grew up in Hoylake and, via Oxford, London and Dhaka, he now lives in the pretty rural village of Slaidburn with his wife Depa; his elderly mother and an adorable moggy called Tasmin. Chris is serving his curacy at St Mary Clitheroe and Downham where he will continue to bring the Gospel, through words and actions, to the people of Clitheroe.

Revd Claire McEnery. Claire was born in Oswaldtwistle but grew up on a farm in Read, a small village in the Ribble Valley. She worked as a police officer for 30 years, retiring at the rank of Detective Superintendent. She then became an Independent Safeguarding Consultant working across various organisations. Claire came to faith in her 50s after a conversion experience that changed her life dramatically. She lives in a farmhouse in Read, next door to her mother and is married to Steve. She has a stepdaughter and grandson. Claire is serving her curacy at Read St John and Simonstone St Peter.

in the NHS across the north of England. More recently she has used her experience in a variety of roles in the Church of England. Sam is blessed by a close loving family; mum, sister, niece Jodie and three beautiful, sassy, intelligent great nieces as well as twin nephews Arron and Morgan. And of course, Coco the chocolate labradoodle. Sam loves serving her

curacy in her home church of Brindle St James.

Revd Tracy Hallows. Born in Swindon, Tracy and her younger brother grew up in a military household. Their mum was a dedicated member of the local church. The family settled in Lancashire in 1969. Pippalina now lives and serves in the United Benefice of Dolphinholme, Quernmore and Over-Wyresdale, a beautiful rural area on the edge of the forest of Bowland near Lancaster. Preface

The Church of England is part of the One, Holy, Catholic and Apostolic Church, worshipping the one true God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit. It professes the faith uniquely revealed in the Holy Scriptures and set forth in the catholic creeds, which faith the Church is called upon to proclaim afresh in each generation. Led by the Holy Spirit, it has borne witness to Christian truth in its historic formularies, the Thirty-Nine Articles of Religion, *The Book of Common Prayer* and the Ordering of Bishops, Priests and Deacons. In the declaration you are about to make, will you affirm your loyalty to this inheritance of faith as your inspiration and guidance under God in bringing the grace and truth of Christ to this generation and making him known to those in your care?

Declaration of Assent

I, N, do so affirm, and accordingly declare my belief in the faith which is revealed in the Holy Scriptures and set forth in the catholic creeds and to which the historic formularies of the Church of England bear witness; and in public prayer and administration of the sacraments, I will use only the forms of service which are authorised or allowed by Canon.

Oath of Allegiance

I, N, do swear that I will be faithful and bear true allegiance to His Majesty, King Charles the Third, his Heirs and Successors, according to Law;

so help me God.

Oath of Canonical Obedience

I, N, do swear by almighty God that I will pay true and canonical obedience to the Lord Bishop of Blackburn and his Successors in all things lawful and honest;

so help me God.

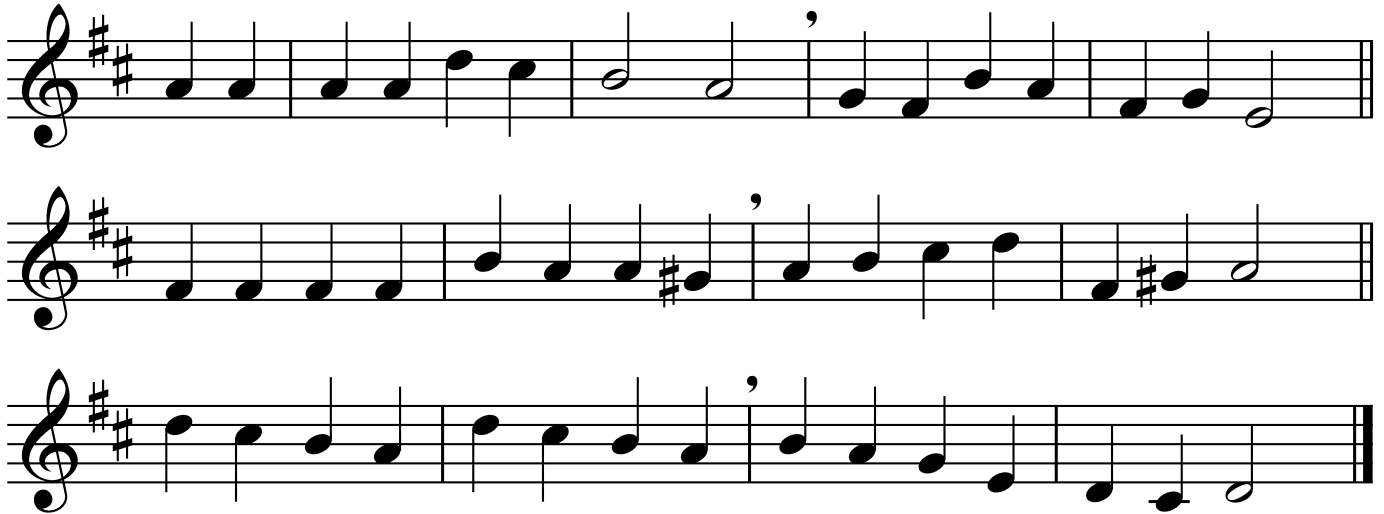

The Introduction

The Bishop invites the congregation to sit

God calls his people to follow Christ, and forms us into a royal priesthood, a holy nation, to declare the wonderful deeds of him who has called us out of darkness into his marvellous light.

The Church is the Body of Christ, the people of God and the dwelling-place of the Holy Spirit. In baptism the whole Church is summoned to witness to God's love and to work for the coming of his kingdom.

To serve this royal priesthood, God has given particular ministries. Priests are called to lead God's people in the offering of praise and the proclamation of the gospel. They share with the Bishop in the oversight of the Church, delighting in its beauty and rejoicing in its well-being. They are to set the example of the Good Shepherd always before them as the pattern of their calling. With the Bishop and their fellow presbyters, they are to sustain the community of the faithful by the ministry of word and sacrament, that we all may grow into the fullness of Christ and be a living sacrifice acceptable to God.

DoM Have those whose duty it is to know these ordinands and examine them found them to be of godly life and sound learning?
 They have.

DoM Do they believe them to be duly called to serve God in this ministry?
 They do.

The Bishop turns to the ordinands and says

Do you believe that God is calling you to this ministry?

Ordinands I do so believe.

The Bishop continues

I invite the Archdeacon to confirm that the ordinands have taken the necessary oaths and made the Declaration of Assent.

The Archdeacon says

They have duly taken the oath of allegiance to the Sovereign and the oath of canonical obedience to the Bishop. They have affirmed and declared their belief in 'the faith which is revealed in the Holy Scriptures and set forth in the catholic creeds and to which the historic formularies of the Church of England bear witness'.

Bishop Philip invites any children who wish to join the supervised children's work in the conference suite to join him at the front. We ask parents to accompany them and sign them in before leaving them for about 20 minutes. They will return after the sermon in time to see the ordination.

A reading from the book of Genesis

The Lord appeared to Abraham by the oaks of Mamre, as he sat at the entrance of his tent in the heat of the day. He looked up and saw three men standing near him. When he saw them, he ran from the tent entrance to meet them, and bowed down to the ground. He said, 'My lord, if I find favour with you, do not pass by your servant. Let a little water be brought, and wash your feet, and rest yourselves under the tree. Let me bring a little bread, that you may refresh yourselves, and after that you may pass on—since you have come to your servant.' So they said, 'Do as you have said.' And Abraham hastened into the tent to Sarah, and said, 'Make ready quickly three measures of choice flour, knead it, and make cakes.' Abraham ran to the herd, and took a calf, tender and good, and gave it to the servant, who hastened to prepare it. Then he took curds and milk and the calf that he had prepared, and set it before them; and he stood by them under the tree while they ate.

They said to him, 'Where is your wife Sarah?' And he said, 'There, in the tent.' Then one said, 'I will surely return to you in due season, and your wife Sarah shall have a son.' And Sarah was listening at the tent entrance behind him. Now Abraham and Sarah were old, advanced in age; it had ceased to be with Sarah after the manner of women. So Sarah laughed to herself, saying, 'After I have grown old, and my husband is old, shall I have pleasure?' The Lord said to Abraham, 'Why did Sarah laugh, and say, "Shall I indeed bear a child, now that I am old?" Is anything too wonderful for the Lord? At the set time I will return to you, in due season, and Sarah shall have a son.' But Sarah denied, saying, 'I did not laugh'; for she was afraid. He said, 'Oh yes, you did laugh.'

For he received honour and glory from God the Father when that voice was conveyed to him by the Majestic Glory, saying, 'This is my Son, my Beloved, with whom I am well pleased.' We ourselves heard this voice come from heaven, while we were with him on the holy mountain.

The Gospel

Matthew 8. 5-17

Remain standing and turn to face the Gospel procession

The Deacon says

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Matthew
Glory to you, O Lord.

When he entered Capernaum, a centurion came to him, appealing to him and saying, 'Lord, my servant is lying at home paralysed, in terrible distress.' And he said to him, 'I will come and cure him.' The centurion answered, 'Lord, I am not worthy to have you come under my roof; but only speak the word, and my servant will be healed. For I also am a man under authority, with soldiers under me; and I say to one, "Go", and he goes, and to another, "Come", and he comes, and to my slave, "Do this", and the slave does it.' When Jesus heard him, he was amazed and said to those who followed him, 'Truly I tell you, in no one in Israel have I found such faith. I tell you, many will come from east and west and will eat with Abraham and Isaac and Jacob in the kingdom of heaven, while the heirs of the kingdom will be thrown into the outer darkness, where there will be weeping and gnashing of teeth.' And to the centurion Jesus said, 'Go; let it be done for you according to your faith.' And the servant was healed in that hour.

When Jesus entered Peter's house, he saw his mother-in-law lying in bed with a fever; he touched her hand, and the fever left her, and she got up and began to serve him. That evening they brought to him many who were possessed by demons; and he cast out the spirits with a word, and cured all who were sick. This was to fulfil what had been spoken through the prophet Isaiah, 'He took our infirmities and bore our diseases.'

The Liturgy of Ordination

The Declarations

The ordinands stand before the bishop, who addresses the congregation

Priests are called to be servants and shepherds among the people to whom they are sent. With their Bishop and fellow ministers, they are to proclaim the word of the Lord and to watch for the signs of God's new creation. They are to be messengers, sentinels, and stewards of the Lord; they are to teach and to admonish, to feed and provide for his family, to search for his children in the wilderness of this world's temptations, and to guide them through its confusions, that they may be saved through Christ for ever. Formed by the word, they are to call their hearers to repentance and to declare in Christ's name the absolution and forgiveness of their sins.

With all God's people, they are to tell the story of God's love. They are to baptise new disciples in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit, and to walk with them in the way of Christ, nurturing them in the faith. They are to unfold the Scriptures, to preach the word in season and out of season, and to declare the mighty acts of God. They are to preside at the Lord's table and lead his people in worship, offering with them a spiritual sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving. They are to bless the people in God's name. They are to resist evil, support the weak, defend the poor, and intercede for all in need.

They are to minister to the sick and prepare the dying for their death. Guided by the Spirit, they are to discern and foster the gifts of all God's people, that the whole Church may be built up in unity and faith.

The Bishop addresses the ordinands

We trust that you are fully determined, by the grace of God, to give yourself wholly to his service, that you may draw his people into that new life which God has prepared for those who love him.

And now, in order that we may know your mind and purpose, you must make the declarations we put to you.

Do you accept the Holy Scriptures as revealing all things necessary for eternal salvation through faith in Jesus Christ?

Ordinands I do so accept them.

Will you lead Christ's people in proclaiming his glorious gospel, so that the good news of salvation may be heard in every place?

Ordinands By the help of God, I will.

Will you faithfully minister the doctrine and sacraments of Christ as the Church of England has received them, so that the people committed to your charge may be defended against error and flourish in the faith?

Ordinands By the help of God, I will.

Will you, knowing yourself to be reconciled to God in Christ, strive to be an instrument of God's peace in the Church and in the world?

Ordinands By the help of God, I will.

Will you endeavour to fashion your own life and that of your household according to the way of Christ, that you may be a pattern and example to Christ's people?

Ordinands By the help of God, I will.

Will you work with your fellow servants in the gospel for the sake of the kingdom of God?

Ordinands By the help of God, I will.

Will you accept the discipline of this Church and respect authority duly exercised within it?

Ordinands By the help of God, I will.

Will you then, in the strength of the Holy Spirit, continually stir up the gift of God that is in you, to make Christ known among all whom you serve?

Ordinands By the help of God, I will.

The congregation stands and the ordinands turn and face them. The Bishop continues

Brothers and sisters, you have heard how great is the charge that these ordinands are ready to undertake, and you have heard their declarations. Is it now your will that they should be ordained?

It is.

Will you continually pray for them?

We will.

Will you uphold and encourage them in their ministry?

We will.

The ordinands turn back to face the Bishop, who continues addressing them

In the name of our Lord, we bid you remember the greatness of the trust that is now to be committed to your charge. Remember always with thanksgiving that the treasure now to be entrusted to you is Christ's own flock, bought by the shedding of his blood on the cross. It is to him that you will render account for your stewardship of his people.

You cannot bear the weight of this calling in your own strength, but only by the grace and power of God. Pray therefore that your heart may daily be enlarged and your understanding of the Scriptures enlightened.

Pray earnestly for the gift of the Holy Spirit.

The ordinands and congregation kneel (if you are able) and silence is kept

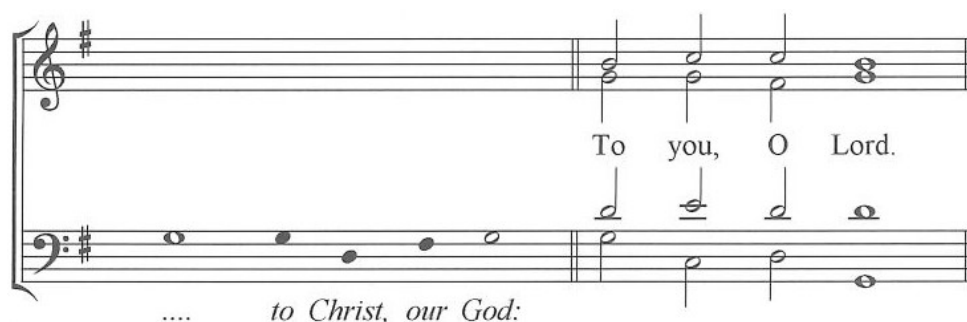

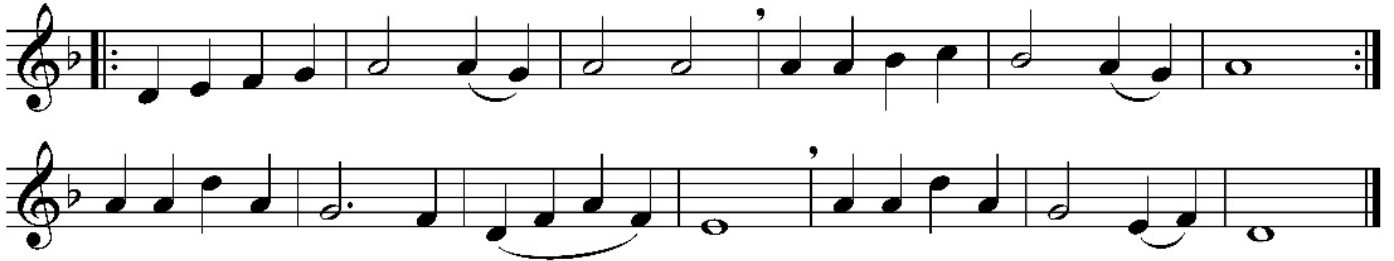
