



A reading from the letter of James.

Not many of you should become teachers, my brothers and sisters, for you know that we who teach will be judged with greater strictness. For all of us make many mistakes. Anyone who makes no mistakes in speaking is perfect, able to keep the whole body in check with a bridle. If we put bits into the mouths of horses to make them obey us, we guide their whole bodies. Or look at ships: though they are so large that it takes strong winds to drive them, yet they are guided by a very small rudder wherever the will of the pilot directs. So also the tongue is a small member, yet it boasts of great exploits.


How great a forest is set ablaze by a small fire! And the tongue is a fire. The tongue is placed among our members as a world of iniquity; it stains the whole body, sets on fire the cycle of nature, and is itself set on fire by hell. For every species of beast and bird, of reptile and sea creature, can be tamed and has been tamed by the human species, but no one can tame the tongue – a restless evil, full of deadly poison. With it we bless the Lord and Father, and with it we curse those who are made in the likeness of God. From the same mouth come blessing and cursing. My brothers and sisters, this ought not to be so. Does a spring pour forth from the same opening both fresh and brackish water? Can a fig tree, my brothers and sisters, yield olives, or a grapevine figs? No more can salt water yield fresh.

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Mark.

Jesus went on with his disciples to the villages of Caesarea Philippi; and on the way he asked his disciples, 'Who do people say that I am?' And they answered him, 'John the Baptist; and others, Elijah; and still others, one of the prophets.' He asked them, 'But who do you say that I am?' Peter answered him, 'You are the Messiah.' And he sternly ordered them not to tell anyone about him.

Then he began to teach them that the Son of Man must undergo great suffering, and be rejected by the elders, the chief priests, and the scribes, and be killed, and after three days rise again. He said all this quite openly. And Peter took him aside and began to rebuke him. But turning and looking at his disciples, he rebuked Peter and said, 'Get behind me, Satan! For you are setting your mind not on divine things but on human things.'

He called the crowd with his disciples, and said to them, 'If any want to become my followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me. For those who want to save their life will lose it, and those who lose their life for my sake, and for the sake of the gospel, will save it. For what will it profit them to gain the whole world and forfeit their life? Indeed, what can they give in return for their life? Those who are ashamed of me and of my words in this adulterous and sinful generation, of them the Son of Man will also be ashamed when he comes in the glory of his Father with the holy angels.'



'Back to Cathedral' Sundays

We have designated two Sundays in September as 'Back to Cathedral' Sundays. During the last sixteen months, many across our congregations have been anxious about gathering in public spaces, particularly prior to the development of vaccines. Now that the government have relaxed the restrictions relating to COVID, and by September a very high percentage of the population should be double vaccinated, we are preparing to welcome as many as possible back to regular Sunday worship in September. To encourage people to dip their toe back into the water of corporate worship, we have designated September 12th and 19th as 'Back to Cathedral' Sundays. So, what will be happening?

This morning after the 9.00am service, there was a brunch for those who attended. This provided an opportunity for folk to gather safely, reconnect with others and to hear a little more about where we are, as a Cathedral community, and what plans we are putting in place for moving forward.

This afternoon following Choral Evensong at 4.00pm, we will be hosting a welcome reception for all who attend. As in the morning it will provide an opportunity to reconnect with folk we have not seen for some time.

On Sunday 19th September following the 10.30am service there will be a light lunch for those who attend. As with the brunch on the 12th there will be ample opportunity for folk to reconnect with others and to hear a little more about where we are, as a Cathedral community, and what plans we are putting in place for moving forward. All events will be delivered in as safe a way as possible.

All events will be great opportunities to bring friends to the Cathedral. Many, after the challenges of COVID, are asking questions about life and an open invitation might just be the thing they need to help them re-engage and find a sense of belonging once again. The God we worship is a generous and loving God and whose arms are open to all. What better moment to invite folk to the Cathedral!

Cathedral house groups and study groups.

The groups are designed to explore more about the Christian faith with each other in a safe and non-judgemental environment, whether you have been coming to church for many years or are new to Christianity. It can feel lonely

trying to be a Christian if we don't have other people around with whom we can share our faith, so the groups give participants a chance to talk and discuss, to share their thoughts and experiences, and to enjoy each other's company, building friendships.

Over the next few months, the groups will be focussed on: 'What do we actually believe?' Each month, looking at a line from the Creed, alongside a passage from Mark's Gospel, will be an opportunity to tease out different viewpoints and what we think we mean by 'God', 'forgiveness', 'resurrection' and much, much more! Each session is 'stand-alone', so anyone can join at any time.

If you are not already part of a group, please contact Rowena Pailing on missioner@blackburncathedral.co.uk (rather than house group leaders directly) to work out which group would be best for you.

We are also offering a Christian Basics course again this Autumn, looking at some of the same topics, but delivered slightly differently. No previous knowledge is assumed, so again, please contact missioner@blackburncathedral.co.uk if you are interested.
