

The Giving of Communion

The Bishop says

Draw near with faith. Receive the body of our Lord Jesus Christ
which he gave for you, and his blood which he shed for you.

Eat and drink in remembrance that he died for you,
and feed on him in your hearts by faith with thanksgiving.

While you are waiting to go for communion you may wish to sit down.

*When the stewards invite you to go forward, please approach the two communion
stations at the front or rear of the Nave for bread in single file along the side aisles of
the Nave.*

Please do come and ask this first minister for any blessings.

Communion is available in both kinds, and the minister distributing bread may say

The body of Christ, broken for you.
Amen.

After receiving the bread, if you wish to receive wine please move to the station near the central aisle, and return to your place by the central aisle of the Nave.

The minister distributing wine may

The blood of Christ, shed for you.

Amen.

If you do not wish to receive communion wine, please walk past that second distribution point, and return to your place by the central aisle of the Nave.

In the South Transept, when the stewards invite you to go forward, please approach the communion station for bread in single file down the central aisle and return to your place by the side aisles.

For gluten-free wafers please use the two stations at the front of the Nave.
